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My paper uses the Icelandic sagas to challenge the claim of legal historians that primitive law is mere formalist process, unable to find fact much less distinguish law from it. I argue that the sagas are intensely interested in legal fact, and that their facticity is at the heart of the famed "objectivity" or "externality" of saga style.
